I am writing to express my support for the renaming of the Roxbury Branch of the Boston Library in honor of Sarah-Ann Shaw.

Sarah-Ann Shaw was a lifelong resident of Roxbury, a pioneering journalist and activist, and the first black woman television reporter in the City of Boston. She made appearances on shows like *Say Brother*, and after numerous appearances on the show, was hired by WBZ-TV as Boston's first female African American reporter in 1969. Shaw strived to combat stereotypes by featuring special reports that emphasized contributions made by diverse communities across the Commonwealth.

Shaw cared about our community and was deeply involved in the civil rights movement. Her work extended far beyond journalism, as she actively supported various social and educational causes, including the Freedom House and the National Association of Black Journalists (NABJ). During her tenure at WBZ-TV, Shaw became a prominent figure, especially for her coverage of Boston's school desegregation.

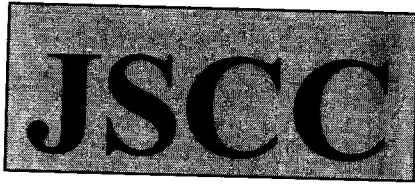

She would often visit and volunteer to speak with students at my school and at the various elementary schools near her home. Sarah Ann lived right down the street from Warren Street, not far from the Roxbury Library Branch and the Roxbury Boys and Girls Club. Sarah Ann always made herself available and never shied away from taking a stand when it came to doing what was right. I developed the utmost respect for her as both a news reporter and a community activist for education and civil rights.

Therefore, I ask for your consideration in naming the Roxbury Branch of the Boston Public Library after Sarah Ann Shaw, a pioneer who opened doors of opportunity for Black and minority individuals in the local broadcasting industry, as well as a community activist in education and civil rights.

I am writing on behalf of myself and my family, Kathy, Amaru and Joaquin to express our enthusiastic and wholehearted support for naming the Roxbury branch of the Boston Public Library in honor of Sarah-Ann Shaw.

Ms. Shaw was a Roxbury icon and a Boston treasure. As a pioneering journalist, lifelong community advocate, and steadfast champion of civil rights, she represents the very best of our city. Her life and legacy are inseparable from the fabric of Roxbury—woven through decades of public service, activism, mentorship, and love for our neighborhoods and our children.

While I only learned of Sarah-Ann after moving to Boston in 2005, a mentee of Amanda V. Houston made sure to tell me that I needed to meet Sarah-Ann—and others like her—for a proper orientation to Boston, vis-à-vis Roxbury. That orientation proved pivotal to my understanding of the place I had found myself in—a place I would come to choose as home, where I would plant roots, purchase a house, and raise my family.

Sarah-Ann Shaw stood shoulder to shoulder with other legendary Roxbury matriarchs such as Melnea Cass and Elma Lewis—women whose moral authority and civic vision reshaped Boston and elevated the voices of those too often left unheard. Like them, Ms. Shaw believed deeply in the power of education, culture, and literacy to transform lives and communities. Her work—both in front of the camera and behind the scenes—embodied that belief, as she continually invested in the next generation with wisdom, grace, and determination.

As a parent raising children in Roxbury, I am especially moved by the symbolism of this naming. Our family regularly patrons the Roxbury branch of the BPL. To be able to bring my children to a library that bears the name of Sarah-Ann Shaw—someone I had the personal honor of knowing—is a source of joy and pride. It is a reminder to my children that leadership, integrity, and service begin right here in their own community.

Libraries are sanctuaries of learning, imagination, and empowerment. Naming this branch after Sarah-Ann Shaw will be a powerful affirmation of the values she stood for and the dreams she helped cultivate across generations of Roxbury residents.

We earnestly and respectfully urge the Board to approve this naming and honor a woman who honored us all with her presence, voice, and example.

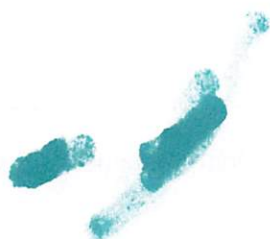

Dear Dr. Liu,

On behalf of the Shaw family, I would like to thank you and your Boston Public Library (BPL) Board colleagues for considering a name change to the Roxbury Branch Library that would honor my mother, Sarah-Ann Shaw. This is a complicated process at a time when even positive changes will become politicized; and I appreciate the effort of the BPL Trustees and the Mayor's office. However, she would not have wanted this to be a divisive course for Roxbury.

A little bit about my Mom. A Boston native she was born in 1933, into a city that often-limited full participation for Black people. With a lot of support, hard work, and divine intervention, she was able to become successful. She was a tireless advocate for Roxbury/ South Dorchester, and she was dedicated to promoting equity for all people. That fierce dedication was particularly used to advance people of color and others who were marginalized. Mom viewed education and literacy as critical factors for success in life. Much of her achievement she credited to the Higginson School, Girl's Latin School, and to parents who made books and culture available at all times. This evolved into her support for the Roxbury Branch Library where she played many key roles.

Even before her retirement she spent weekend hours at the branch attending meetings, checking out dozens of books at a time, or enjoying programs. After retirement, she had the bandwidth to participate on committees such as the Dudley Master Plan and the Friends of the Roxbury Branch Library which resulted in a beautiful building and a renewed mission. As you know, while healthy, she was also eager to be a contributing member of the Community Engagement Subcommittee of the Roxbury Fellowes Fund. The public role was obvious, but I have also found many fundraising tickets, leaflets, proposals, and other tokens of her internal work for the Roxbury branch. She would roll up her sleeves for scholarship drives, bake sales, and educational programs for children. These tokens speak to her devotion to the Friends of the library, and the branch in tangible, less public ways. Her efforts were selfless contributions for the public good and the uplift of the next generation.

This possibility would be a true joy to a woman who loved the library and the Roxbury community. Hopefully, this legacy will inspire younger Bostonians to learn more about her and become inspired. Thank you once again.
